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I have been investing in the stock market since 1966. One of the best places I have found to invest in the last ten years is TQQQ. I am not professional but I know when to buy and when to sell this particular product. Any person who spends 30 minutes reading about TQQQ and similar products knows what to do and what not to do. Like any investment, you have to pay attention and not panic.

The "investors" who complain about the volatility do not understand the investment. I am not a professional investor. I was a professor of education for 35 years, and currently operate a non-profit educational organization. I am clearly no stock market professional. However, I have done very well with TQQQ and similar products. Yes, occasionally I have lost money in stocks, however I have never lost money with TQQQ. Overall I have done very, very well.

I just sold two stocks at losses. Anything in any stock market is a risk. Every investor is personally responsible for researching their investment.

TQQQ and similar devices are excellent for any investor. It is certainly as good as buying Ford, News Corp, or Johnson Controls. Look at how those stocks tanked.

Because people put their money into something they did not properly research or learn to use effectively is no reason to limit investor's access to the newest devices that are really useful. My grandfather bought Red Rock Mines, a Canadian company in the 1930's. My grandfather, a machinist, did well in the stock market. He exits the 30's very well off. But Red Rock was a bust. Look it up. That is how the stock market works.

Do not change the rules for TQQQ and similar instruments because some investors did not take the time to read and learn. Those are not investors, They are adult children with money. The rest of us need a free market with reasonable regulations which is exactly what is happening now.

The problem is not TQQQ and similar new instruments. The problem is people with money who do not know what they are investing in nor how to invest. Again, keep these devices as part of the regular market.

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
